

With such a diverse panel, there were many perspectives and a variety of feedback provided to each researcher. In this blog post, I would like to go over some of the main things I look for and the key questions I consider when providing feedback on a draft grant proposal.

Why Does This Matter?

- Current youth engagement in research can be exclusionary and transactional
- What is the purpose of the research? Who are you trying to reach / help?
- Lived experience = expertise
- Empowering youth is an investment



It's Up to You (Yes, You!)

- Youth involvement in research doesn't have to be limited to one stage of the process.
- Youth can be resources in areas like knowledge translation and dissemination.
- The key is creating space for youth involvement and <u>co-creation</u>:
 - Think outside the box
 - Talk to youth
 - Collaboration, not tokenization
